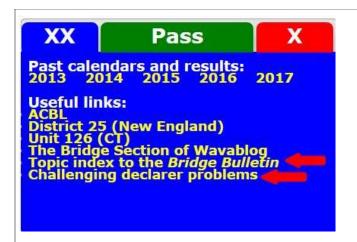

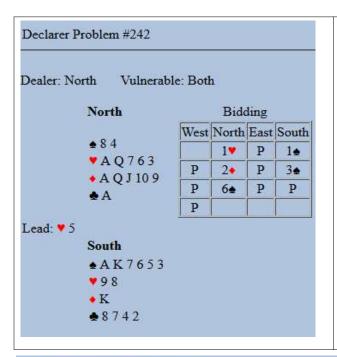

The "Challenging declarer problems" links to a program that I wrote after collecting hundreds of problems from diverse sources. They are displayed in random order. One is shown below.



The program shows you the dealer, the vulnerability, the auction, and both hands. South is always the declarer. On the left is the opening lead, and at the bottom is any additional information you need about the first two tricks, if any.

When you click on the "Solve" button at the bottom of the screen, the best method of playing the hand (as specified by the source) appears to the right of the auction, as displayed below.
